WESTLAND HAS SUCCESSFUL YEAR

Westland Section of the NZ Institute of Forestry completed its most successful recent year, through the auspices of the West Coast Combined Forests Group, under which joint activities are held with the NZ Farm Forestry Association and the NZ Tree Crops Association.

Regular monthly field trips were held and included Biogrow properties, beech forest regeneration, nursery visits, two special beech forest management seminars, agroforestry, fruit/shelter plantings, flax growing and culture, John Adams' forestry property, and a convivial Christmas function at Punakaiki, including the Herb Society. Members attended public meetings concerned with the indigenous forest policy, assisted council with submissions, and raised considerable local section funds from its very successful book sales operations.

Social occasions have in the main concentrated around evening dinners hosting visiting forestry groups. First was a visit by the Canadian Loggers Association members and spouses, and this was followed by two nights spent by Australians on the ANZIF pre-conference tour. Visits commenced in Inangahua looking at the potential for beech management, and proceeded down the Grey Valley and on along the Punakaiki coast to overnight in Greymouth, before going across Arthur's Pass, or down to the podocarp forests of South Westland, and the glaciers on the World Heritage Area centred on Haast.

Hazel Nicholls, President of the Tree Crops Association, provided a stimulating evening discussion on crop trees and membership potential on her recent visit to the West Coast.

Quarterly Newsletters are sent out. Total branch membership is 49, comprising 11 national members and 38 local members.
